Stewardship in Motion

The Bread of Sife Bread comes in many types. A quick research expedition to your nearest grocery store will reveal a large variety.

There are ethnic breads: French, Sweet Hawaiian and Italian. There are various ingredients: rye, flaxseeds, sesame seeds, potato, rosemary and oat nut. Some breads use a combination of grains for flour. There are 5-grain, 7-grain and multigrain (too many to count). You may even find a popular bread based on a bible verse, Ezekiel 4:9 (which describes an ancient bread recipe used by the prophet as an illustration of the coming destruction of Jerusalem).

You may also be surprised to find the cost of some of the loaves. One of the most expensive you may discover is a "Four Cheese Sourdough" that costs approximately \$6.00 and has about 15 slices. Therefore if you choose this variety, the cost for the bread part of your sandwich will be about 80 cents. The least expensive you may find is about \$1.50 for a small loaf of white sandwich bread that will have about 20 slices or 15 cents for the economy sandwich.

In human history, bread has been a staple since prehistoric times. Loaves of bread have been found intact in Egyptian tombs, some estimated to be 4,500 years old. For most of this time, baking bread was a semi-daily household task. The preliminaries to baking were planting and harvesting grain, processing the grain into flour, mixing the flour with oil, yeast and other ingredients to form the bread dough, allowing the dough to ferment (rise), then baking the loaf.

In ancient Jewish villages, the baking might be in a community oven fired up to service many households. Friday was a busy baking day for no baking was done on Saturday, the Sabbath.

There are many connections to bread in the life of Jesus. He was Born in Bethlehem, a city name that means "House of Bread." (I have had the privilege of traveling to this city.) Jesus was tempted by Satan to misuse his power and turn stones into bread to satisfy his hunger during a lengthy fast. He taught his disciples to pray for their Father to give them "daily bread." He used the bread of the Last Supper, in which the bread is transformed into His body given as a sacrifice for us. A profound connection between Jesus and bread comes in the middle of his

public ministry. The Gospel records two times where Jesus "multiplied loaves" in order to feed large crowds of hungry people. In the Gospel of John, one of these accompanied his "Bread of Life" discourse, a teaching time in which he refers to himself as "Living Bread" and "Bread from Heaven." In so doing, He positions Himself in the role of Provider, a type of fulfillment of the act of God in providing manna for the people of Israel while in the wilderness of the Sinai. (I have experienced that wilderness of the Sinai and it is stark.)

As our **Stewardship of Bread** unfolds for us this autumn, let us consider how we are to understand this man Jesus who could feed thousands with a few loaves of bread. This is a matter for serious reflection and faith. Coming to grips with Jesus as our provider is a most important task for us to consider as Christian disciples and stewards. At our next meal, most of us will likely include some type of bread as part of the meal. As we eat the bread, meditate for a moment and think about the Christ who gives us our "daily bread" and how we can best serve Him with the life we live.

Message from Karen Norton, Senior Warden

With the upcoming installation of our new Rector, The Reverend Dr. Mary J. Korte, my job will be nearly done. When I accepted the position of Senior Warden in 2013, the possibility of having to find a new Rector was not even considered. Within six months, however, it turned into a reality, and St. Stephen's had to prepare for a transition.

Thanks to the hard work of an entire team of dedicated parishioners, we not only brought in a highly qualified priest-incharge, but we also worked together to create a strong working relationship with her. In the year and a half she has been with us, some practices remained the same, and some were changed. New services, such as the Intergenerational Service, became a big hit; new committees were formed and have begun to hit their stride. It has been a work-in-progress, but more people than ever are involved in decision making, our youth program is slowly expanding, and our attendance is steadily increasing.

One of the major, but probably less noticed, changes Reverend Mary has made is that of the role of the Vestry. Every other Vestry on which I have served was primarily one of input once a month. With the exception of the Wardens, most other Vestry members showed up on meeting nights and were not expected to work in between.

That has all changed. Your Vestry is now actively involved in all parts of parish life. You have seen them every week at the 8:30 am and 10:30 am services as the Vestry-member-in-charge. They are in charge of committees. They are in church as often as possible. They participate in activities of the church. They are the first to pledge to the stewardship campaign. They have been expected to be the leaders of the church, and they have become that!






